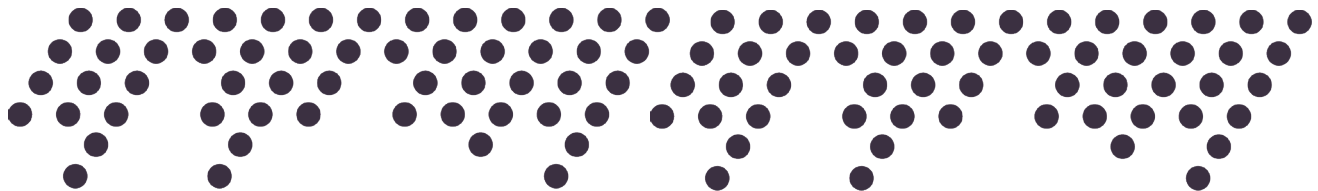

Answer the following questions about your work.

Overview

What story would you like to tell?
Why does it matter? To whom?

Process/Approach

What was your process or approach? How was it unique or different? How did you ensure your process or approach was inclusive and cross-sector?

Outcomes

How did you measure success?
What outcomes did you achieve?
Why were these important for your community?

Lessons

What lessons did you learn and how are these applicable to other communities?

How are you doing things differently?

Tell us how you are adjusting the way you do things to achieve better results for the communities you serve. It could be in one of these ways - or another.

Clearly explain what's new and different about your approach.



Formats

Please indicate your session format. Note that we are open to additional formats (if described clearly), so feel free to be creative.

- **Panel** 90 minutes (3-4 speakers with a moderator and Q&A)
- **Small Group Breakout** 90 minutes (Short presentations with attendee breakout discussions)
- **Idea Exchange** 45 or 90 minutes (short or no presentation followed by peer to peer facilitated discussion)
- **Toolbox** 45 minutes (focus on tools or specific stories in shorter time)

Track 6: Mpack PK Slam

For the Tuesday night PK Slam, powered by PechaKucha™, propose your cutting edge take on how work gets done, the industry, or topics we're not focusing on enough. Each speaker gets 20 slides and 20 seconds for each, for a total of just under 7 minutes.

We'd especially like to hear your take on the future of public transportation post-pandemic. We're all talking about it all the time and no one really knows, so get wild with your ideas about what the future will be! What kind of "mpack" would you like to see – for social equity, environment, economics, other? There's a wide berth of possibilities. Any answer you give is speculative sci fi, which, especially at the PK Slam, can be quite entertaining.

How to submit

1. Prepare your individual or group proposal using worksheets available at www.mpactmobility.org/speakers. Choose the track that best fits your proposal. Tell us about your work - overview, process/ approach, outcomes, and lessons. Indicate format.
2. Complete the online proposal form by March 31, midnight Honolulu time. The link to submit is at www.mpactmobility.org/speakers.

Tips

- Fill out the whole online form. Incomplete proposals will not be considered.
- Make sure you can be in Phoenix in November. If your proposal is accepted, you will be expected to be there. Speakers have the option to attend for free the day they speak or to register and pay for the full conference.
- **Group proposals:** Before you include a speaker in your proposal, contact them to make sure they are interested and able to attend. Group proposals must include diverse perspectives. Note: we may accept your group proposal as is or we may mix and match with other proposals.

What happens after you submit?

April

After the Call for Speakers closes March 31, proposals will be read, sorted and ranked by members of our National Steering Committee (NSC).

May

The full National Steering Committee will meet to discuss proposals and curate topics and sessions. Individual NSC members will choose specific sessions to coordinate. NSC coordinators may reach out to you about your proposal.

June

The full National Steering Committee will meet again to review and vet proposed conference sessions. This is a back and forth process, involving critique of individual sessions and the program as a whole. Speakers and topics may be adjusted at this point.

July

National Steering Committee members will reach out to confirm speakers for sessions and confirm the content to be covered.

August

All proposers will have a final decision about whether they will be speakers or not in 2023.

September-October

National Steering Committee coordinators will meet with their session's speakers to go over the flow of content and audience engagement at the conference.

November

Mpact Transit + Community 2023 will take place from November 5-8 in Phoenix, AZ, with pre-conference events on November 3-4.
