HOW TO NAVIGATE THE VIRTUAL CONFERENCE

Let's Get Real

The 2020 Rail~Volution conference may be virtual -

but the experience and connections are real. Make the most of them by taking the time to get comfortable with the online environment and your conference tools. Use this overview as your guide. Debate, discuss, share and learn: in some ways, this year's conference is no different than the rest.

Pack Your Virtual Suitcase

There are a few things you need to do to get ready for the conference. Stop by early (any time after October 14) to set up your profile and explore.

- First, you'll need the invitation e-mail (sent to the e-mail address you used to register). Click on the authorization link to automatically log in to the community. Confirm your account information, accept the terms of service, and set up your password. Use this password, your registration e-mail address and the conference address (railvolution2020.pathable.co) to log in at any time. Use desktop or laptop computers for the best conference experience.
- Next set up your profile. Your profile is how other conferencegoers find you. Not filling out your profile is like spending the entire conference in your hotel room! Navigate to Account and Edit My Profile. Add a photo, a short bio, e-mail and social handles.

Take a Look Around

Once you arrive at the virtual conference, wander around a bit. Get to know the spaces. Navigate the top bar and follow the drop-down menus.

- Home Find links to key conference events and what's up next on your Personal Schedule.
- Agenda Follow this drop-down menu for the entire Conference Schedule and another view of your Personal Schedule. Click on an item in the Agenda to read the description, reserve a spot and add it to your Personal Schedule. There's also a button for Notes, which you can download and send to yourself later. Within each session, you can post questions or comments in the chat, participate in polls, see who else is attending and download files provided by presenters. When it's time to attend the session, a "Join Live Meeting Now" button activates. Click this button to enter the session.
- **People** − Find attendees, speakers and other groups here. Connect with them directly – send a message or suggest a meeting.
- Public Square Here's the place to hang out. Check out booths from exhibitors and sponsors. See the Virtual Mobile Workshops. See who's leading in the Conference Game. Scroll the Social Wall, a compilation of posts from Twitter, Instagram and Facebook, #railvolution
- Networking and Dialogue See the options for joining or starting a small group conversation. Add your voice. Listen to what others have to say. Make connections for the year ahead. See pages 6-7 for more about the options.





HOW TO NAVIGATE THE VIRTUAL CONFERENCE

- Forum Open throughout the conference, here's your message board and soap box. Start a conversation on any topic or reply within an existing one. Have some thoughts about a session you attended? Share them here. Join others and post a photo of your town. The Forum is also the place to suggest Unconference Topics for one of the three Networking and Dialogue segments.
- **Help Desk -** Bring your technical questions. Find how-to guides for using the conference site, including system requirements. Message tech support and event staff.

Get Together. Network. Meet.

As with in-person conferences, there are spaces at Rail~Volution 2020 to see who's here and be visible in ways that suit you. You can even meet for a coffee or cocktail. (The price is right when you BYOB!) It may be a challenge with home life buzzing around you, but here are some ways to connect:

- Send a Message or Set a Time to Meet, 1:1 or 1:few Scroll or search the People list to see who's here. Send a message with a photo. (You in your kitchen? With your dog?) Or propose a time to meet during conference hours. Add another person or two and set up a time. Get the gang together - virtually. You can save the group to make it easy to meet again.
- Pre-Conference Coffee Show up early on the two main days of the conference. October 28 and 29, for casual conversation in small groups. Network and nosh with people you met today or ten years ago. BYO bagel, yogurt and coffee. To join, click on Coffee Chat (see Agenda, then Conference Schedule). Hosted by the New Rail~Volutionaries.
- Watch Together, Virtually Bend time zones to watch mobile workshops or this year's PK Slam with friends and peers from across the country. Live comments in the chat box are the virtual equivalent of being in the audience together.

Pick a Session. Pick a Vibe.

The virtual conference has different kinds of rooms, just like in real life. Plenaries and some sessions are webinar style (think college auditorium - see who's there on the People tab), with the option to ask questions via chat. Other rooms are more like Zoom meetings, with a gallery view of everyone attending and vocal participation from the audience. These rooms have the option of breakouts, the virtual equivalent of roundtables, for small group discussions. In a breakout session you're whisked automatically into and out of the breakout room. (It can be surprising, ala Star Trek "Beam me up, Scotty.") Note: Some rooms have limited capacity, especially networking rooms (see pages 6-7). If you've added a session to your Personal Schedule but decide not to attend, please remove it so others can join.

Networking and Dialogue

Building your network at the conference

Keeping connections is one of the most important benefits of any Rail~Volution conference – and this year is no different. We've dedicated three time frames during our virtual conference when you can build and strengthen your network: Wednesday, October 21, following Ibram X. Kendi's keynote discussion; Thursday, October 29, directly preceding the keynote discussion with Akisa Omulepu; and Thursday, November 12, directly before the closing keynote discussion. During these times you will have the choice of several different kinds of dialogue: facilitated Deep-Dive Discussions and Idea Exchanges, Peer Group Meetups, a Talkback discussion and Unconference Topics.

Deep-Dive Discussions

Join in on a facilitated discussion related to building livable communities with transit. The emphasis in these sessions is on leadership, preparing for the future and shaping transit investments to create equitable transit-oriented communities.

Peer Group Meetups

Build your network within the Rail~Volution network. These affinity group gatherings and sessions hosted by organizations from across different sectors and disciplines – COMTO, BRT managers, TOD managers, New Rail~Volutionaries – are excellent forums for transferring knowledge and strengthening relationships.

Unconference Topics

What's on your mind about building livable and equitable communities around transit? What do you think needs more attention? Here's your chance to propose – and lead – your own small group discussion. Navigate to the Unconference Topic channel in the online Forum to see what others have posted. Upvote the topics you want to address. Better yet, post your own topic, along with a note or question to open the discussion. Go to the Forum to nominate or "like" an Unconference Topic. Each Networking and Dialogue time frame includes up to ten sessions of Unconference Topics. The ten topics with the most "likes" (by 4 pm Central, one day prior to scheduled discussions) will be assigned a time slot and room. If your topic is chosen, we'll notify you and share an easy, single-page facilitator guide. You choose! You lead!

How Discussion Rooms Work

You can find preset discussion room options on the Agenda in your virtual conference. Some discussions have multiple rooms allocated to them and some occur only once (denoted with an asterisk*). You can see online who is facilitating each discussion. There are 30 slots for Unconference Topics throughout the conference, populated based on your topic suggestions (see page 6).

In all of these sessions, you have the ability to turn on your camera and microphone to participate in the discussion. To foster lively and engaged conversation, access is limited to 25 participants on a first-come, first-served basis. Save your spot by adding a session to your agenda (limit one session per time slot). When it's time to attend the session, a "Join Live Meeting Now" button activates. Click this button to enter the session.

Virtual Mobile Workshop

La Paz, Bolivia: The World's Largest - and Highest - Urban Cable System

Mi Teleférico, the urban cable system in La Paz, Bolivia, has revolutionized the way locals travel between La Paz and neighboring communities. Around 3,000 people ride the world's highest cable car (13,000 feet/4,000 meters above sea level) every hour. The system has cut an hour-long commute to just 10 minutes and reduced travel costs.

Roberto Ameneiro, an architect with Gamcable SRL in LaPaz, Bolivia will be your guide to Mi Teleférico. The system currently has nine lines in operation, with three more coming soon. Learn how this revolutionary network of cable lines was planned, designed and implemented. Hear how the system runs on electricity, partly solar-powered, to help cut smog in the city. See how it's addressing equity by modernizing mobility and access for all people, especially the city's most vulnerable. Understand why Mi Teleférico's innovation has won numerous international awards in sustainability and design.

Take a virtual journey on the 28-mile Valley Metro light rail connecting communities in Phoenix, Tempe and Mesa. Learn how artwork in 38 stations connects riders with communities through the artists' expressive and powerful storytelling. 

Tactical Anti-Racism: Creating Equitable Communities by Transforming Systems

2020 has been a year of disruption and change. The pandemic has magnified existing racial disparities. Police violence has led to widespread demonstrations calling for changes in systems. Our opening plenary will examine the dynamics that foster systemic racism, as well as the challenges in changing the systems that perpetuate disparities. Join Ibram X. Kendi, leading author and director of Boston University's Center for Antiracist Research. Hear the insights he's gained through research and personal experience: How can we better understand and confront the insidious nature of discrimination? How do we employ tactical antiracism in our planning, policy and practices? How can we transform our systems to create equitable communities?



Ibram X. Kendi is a New York Times bestselling author, the Andrew W. Mellon Professor in the Humanities at Boston University, and the founding director of the BU Center for Antiracist Research. He is the author of *Stamped from the Beginning: The Definitive History of Racist Ideas in America*, which won the National Book Award for Nonfiction, and *The Black Campus Movement*, which won the W.E.B. Du Bois Book Prize. He is also the author of the No. 1

New York Times bestsellers, *How to Be an Antiracist*, and *Stamped: Racism, Antiracism and You*, a young adult remix of *Stamped from the Beginning*, co-authored with Jason Reynolds. He most recently authored the No. 1 indie bestseller, *Antiracist Baby*, available as a board book and picture book for caretakers and little ones.



Adelee Le Grand is a vice president at Transdev, one of the largest providers of mobility solutions. She provides strategic advisory services to transit clients in North America, currently as chief mobility officer at the Atlanta-Region Transit Link Authority (ATL).

What a difference a couple of decades can make. Transit-oriented development just doesn't work the same as it did 25 years ago – or even five years ago. New technology, changing land use patterns and the sharing economy have radically transformed the transit and mobility landscape. How will 2020 change the milieu? What can we expect for transit? Equitable TOD? How will we fit more affordable housing into our communities while improving mobility? Join us to examine new research as well as win-win models of eTOD.



Peter Calthorpe was named one of 25 "innovators on the cutting edge" by *Newsweek Magazine* for his work redefining the models of urban and suburban growth in America. Through design, innovation, publications and realized projects, his 30-year practice has helped solidify a global trend towards the key principles of New Urbanism: Successful places – whether neighborhoods, towns, urban districts or metropolitan regions –

must be diverse in uses and users, must be scaled to the pedestrian and human interaction, and must be environmentally sustainable. Peter is one of the founders of the Congress for the New Urbanism and a winner of the Urban Land Institute's J.C. Nichols Prize for Visionaries in Urban Development. His latest book, *Urbanism in the Age of Climate Change*, documents his work relating patterns of development to energy and carbon emissions, along with other environmental, social and economic impacts. Current projects in China focus on developing standards and examples of Low Carbon Cities.



Allison Brooks is executive director of the Bay Area Regional Collaborative (BARC), a consortium of regional and state agencies working together to address significant challenges impacting the 7.8 million people, nine counties and 101 cities that make up the San Francisco Bay Area.




